- Pin It Up Clip cloth pegs to clothes or a line like a laundry.



Brain Gym is a set of fun, easy movements that help young learners improve their thinking, coordination, and learning skills. It turns playtime into brain-boosting time with actions.




Let your little learner dive into exciting, hands-on activities that reinforce letters and numbers in the most delightful way!

• Sensory Letter & Number Hunt

Transform a bin of rice, sand or beans into a treasure chest of learning. Hide small objects or flashcards that begin with A, B, or show them different numbers. Let your child explore the bin, find the hidden treasures and call them out loud. This boosts letter recognition, number sense and vocabulary—all while having fun.

Alphabet Adventures

Open a book with bold, colourful text and go on a letter hunt! Help your child find A and B on each page and match them to pictures or objects around the house. This fun reading activity builds letter recognition and early phonics skills.





"Your art, your magic, your way!"

Welcome to the Colour Carnival! It's time to dive into a world of colours, creativity and imagination. We've come up with fresh, exciting activities to spark your child's creativity while helping them explore new concepts and skills through art. Let's transform ordinary materials into extraordinary art projects!

1. Have a Heart, do your part- Save Animals
Palm Print Animal Art





<u>Step 1</u>- Help your child select three favourite ANIMALS of his/her choice (such as a panda, tiger, or sea turtle). Help dipping the child's **palm in paint** and press it gently onto paper to make each animal's body.

- Step 2- Help him/her use their fingers or thumbs to add tails, ears, or wings.
- <u>Step 3</u>- Let the paint dry completely. Help draw or glue on details such as eyes, stripes, or shells.
- <u>Step 4</u>- Cut out each palm print animal carefully and assist in pasting each one onto a separate **paper plate**.
- <u>Step 5</u>- Use a string or ribbon to tie the paper plates one below the other to create a vertical hanging display.
- 2 Magic with Shapes- Let's turn simple shapes into a world of imagination! This fun art activity uses basic shapes like circles, squares, triangles and rectangles to create exciting pictures, enhancing fine motor skills.

<u>Step 1</u>- Provide your child with cut-outs of circles, squares, triangles and rectangles in different colours and sizes to spark creativity.

<u>Step 2</u>- Encourage your child to arrange the shapes on an A4 size sheet into a fun picture.

Step 3 - Assist him/her in gluing the shapes onto a blank sheet.

Step 4- Help add creative details with crayons or markers.





3. "A Name to Remember!" - A child's name is their first badge of identity — something they hear, recognize, and cherish from the very beginning. Let's turn that special name into a work of art!



<u>Step 1</u>- Encourage your little one to explore the letters in his/her name and help design a unique nameplate. Whether it's made from cardboard, craft paper or any fun materials you have at home—let their creativity shine!

<u>Step 2</u>- Provide your child with cutouts of the letters of his/her name.

Step 3- Guide the child to arrange and stick the letters on the base.

<u>Step 4</u>- Let them decorate with colours, stickers, ribbons or drawingsanything that reflects their personality!
